# From the Desk of Ms. Thakur, Principal

On Thursday, December 7, I hosted a Principal's Breakfast for parents in our Upper Media Center. Assistant Superintendent of Schools for Curriculum and Instruction, Mrs. Sally Dastoli, was also in attendance. My theme for this particular Principal's Breakfast centered around Reading Comprehension. More specifically, it focused on how parents can help foster reading comprehension skills in their children at home. My special quests were Ms. Brenda McLaughlin (Reading Consultant) and Mrs. Jenn Hammer (Literacy Curriculum Specialist). Brenda and Jenn conducted a mini-lesson with parents that focused on the six most highly effective strategies for strengthening reading comprehension in students. They explained each of the six strategies in depth, and they also modelled how this looks with an actual picture book (Quackers...which was our Read for the Record book purchased by our amazing PTO for all grade levels). Once they were done with their mini-lesson, we then split the parents up into three groups, and we each took the parents into actual classrooms to try out these strategies with students, using the picture book Quackers. Ms. Root (Grade 2), Mrs. Gove (Grade 3), and Mrs. Nunn (Grade 4) all opened up their classrooms to us for a little while, so that parents could experiment first-hand with what they had just learned. Parents had the opportunity to rotate to all three grade levels to see for themselves how these strategies can work with children of all ages. They read the book to the students themselves, and tried out the strategies themselves. When we returned to the Library, parents then had the opportunity to check out a book from the Library, and mark it up with post-it notes in specific strategic places where they will then go home and try out these specific strategies with their own children. It was a fun morning, and parents enjoyed the hands-on learning experience they had. We had a wonderfully diverse and supportive group of parents in attendance, and I thank everyone for coming. We love having parents in our school!



# **Tiger Topics Health Tips**

### 6th graders:



<u>Keep getting the physical forms in to me. I have sent home a reminder slip, please fill out and return</u>

<u>ASAP. I still have many students that have not turned in physicals. A delay in the transfer of health records and progress reports may occur if I do not receive the form before June 1<sup>st</sup> 2018.</u>

**PARENTS** - Many children are coming to school without coats, hats, gloves or proper footwear to go out for recess. The outdoors in winter is enjoyed most when you are dressed properly. It is also SAFER when you are dressed properly. Remember: there is no bad weather, just bad clothing. In winter, the best idea is to stay warm and dry.

**Dress In Layers:** Layers allow you to be more flexible to changing weather conditions and your own activities. Layers create an air space between the skin and the cold and this space is what insulates best. Layers are also looser, allowing for better blood circulation which helps to maintain body temperature.

### **Three layers:**

- Inner (Base) layer: The skin should be covered in a thin layer that helps to move moisture away from the body. Keeping your skin dry helps keep you warm and comfortable. Your inner layer should cover almost your whole body: arms, legs and torso. Polyester and silk, and related modern materials are best. Cotton is a poor choice.
- Middle layer: This is the insulating layer. Wool and fleece work best. The middle layer can be made up of several thin layers.
- Outer layer: This is the water and wind protection layer. Gore-Tex and nylon are best. Get a long coat so that you can sit comfortably. Coats should have high collars and a hood. You should be able to easily ventilate the coat by loosening sleeve ends, opening zippers under the arms and opening a front zipper.

### What we have been seeing here at school:

- A sweatshirt, no jacket
- Ballerina shoes with short socks
- Shorts
- Thin fleece jacket
- Skirts without tights
- Slip on shoes without socks

### **Layering Also Applies To Hands and Feet**

Wear two pairs of socks — a thin polyester sock against the skin and a thicker sock over that. Boots should be comfortable and not too tight. Tightness will constrict blood flow and make your feet colder. Boots should also have a good sole for grip and stability on slippery or uneven surfaces and should be warm and waterproof.

**Scarf and hats:** Your head and neck are major sources of heat loss. A hat and a scarf are a must in cold weather. If you are worried about your child wearing a scarf, try a tube scarf. A balaclava or similar cover for the head, ears and face may be best in very cold weather. Sunglasses can protect your eyes from light reflecting off the snow.

**Key Points**: 1) Be aware of the current and weather forecast, 2) Leave home dressed properly to go out to recess, and 3) Dress in layers

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
