From the Principal's Desk

I have included some helpful information about reading. As you know, being able to decode and interpret text is paramount in your child's life. The article was written by Gary Petersen, one of the curriculum specialists in district. How long or much should my child be reading?

The simple answer is as much as possible. There is no limit if they love their "just right" books. We want your child to be reading as many books that they love, are curious about and most importantly that they can read independently. This means at their level. Assuming we have a rough level of their reading at this point, it comes down to reading volumes of books. Like any sport or hobby, the more you do something, the better you will get at it. This is why it is important to provide sustained period of times at home where your child can read quietly or to you. This can be divided up into smaller periods, but "eyes on text reading" is most important.

Although we don't expect you to figure out how many words per minute your child is reading, the pacing guide below should help you understand that a child should NOT be reading any normal sized book for weeks on end. Hatchet, a popular Gary Paulsen book has approximately 50,000 words and is a level R. At 100 words per minute a child can read that in 16 hours. At 200 words per minute, the child can read a book in 8 hours. As you can see, at either rate, this substantial book should not be lingering in the child hands long. Howliday Inn, a funny James Howe book, is approximately 30,000 words and is a level P. At 100 words per minute your child should be able to read this book in 5 hours.

What does this mean? Watching what your child reads and how long it is taking them to read can give you a window into if they are really reading or "fake" reading. It could be an indication of the difficulty of the book. If they are plowing through volumes of books, this is a great thing. If you find the books are too easy, a meaningful discussion around book choice becomes very important.

Below is a chart that guides us in words per minute. This information helps us be sure the children are reading with VOLUME, STAMINA and TIME-ON-TASK.

Grade 1 between 60 - 90 words per minute Grade 2 between 85- 120 words per minute

Grade 3 between 115-140 words per minute

Grade 4 between 140-170 words per minute

Grade 5 between 170-195 words per minute

Grade 6 between 195-220 words per minute

From the mid-1970s to the present, the consumption of milk by Americans has declined, and the consumption of sweetened beverages has increased. A recent study compared beverage patterns of 10,000 adults, teenagers and children. In all age groups, the largest portion of beverage calories came from sugarsweetened drinks (soft drinks, fruit drinks and presweetened teas and even juices which contain natural sugars). Nutritionists recommend drinking 24oz. of milk a day. On average, teen boys drank only 12 ounces of milk a day, while teen girls averaged less then 1 serving (7 ounces). Adult women (ages 19-49) consumed the least amount of milk - an average of 6 ounces a day, while they drank three times as many sweetened beverages - 18 ounces a day, or 10% of daily calories. This trend could be negatively affecting American's weight. The study found that preteen girls, teenage girls and adult women whose diets consisted of less milk and more sweetened drinks, had significantly greater Body Mass Indexes (BMI) when compared to those who drank more milk. Also Americans that drank more milk and fewer sweetened drinks had diets that were significantly higher in vital nutrients including calcium, magnesium, potassium and vitamin A. Sweetened beverages contributed to calories and added sugar intake, while providing fewer nutrients. Next time you're thirsty, take an extra minute and think about your drink. 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
