Health Quick Tips

From the mid-1970s to the mid-1990s, the consumption of milk by Americans has declined, and the consumption of sweetened beverages has increased. A recent study compared beverage patterns of 10,000 adults, teenagers and children from 1999-2002. In all age groups the largest portion of beverage calories came from sugar-sweetened drinks (<u>soft drinks, fruit drinks and pre-sweetened teas</u>).

Nutritionists recommend drinking 24oz. of milk a day. On average, teen boys drank only 12 ounces of milk a day, while teen girls averaged less then 1 serving (7 ounces). Adult women (ages 19-49) consumed the least amount of milk - an average of 6 ounces a day, while they drank three times as many sweetened beverages - 18 ounces a day, or 10% of daily calories. This trend could be negatively affecting American's weight.

The study found that preteen girls, teenage girls and adult women whose diets consisted of less milk and more sweetened drinks, had significantly greater Body Mass Indexes (BMI) when compared to those who drank more milk. Also Americans that drank more milk and fewer sweetened drinks had diets that were significantly higher in vital nutrients including calcium, magnesium, potassium and vitamin A. Sweetened beverages contributed to calories and added sugar intake, while providing fewer nutrients. Next time you're thirsty, take an extra minute and think about your drink. Teaching Your Child How to be a Mathematician

In addition to teaching all the important skills in math, we are working hard to teach students how to be mathematicians.

The Common Core State Standards (CCSS) have 2 sets of standards for math: content standards and practice standards. The content standards are the "what" we teach, and the practice standards are the "how" we teach. The practice standards are just as important as the concepts and skills we teach in each unit of study.

The same eight practice standards apply to every grade level. We start this work in Kindergarten and help students grow as mathematicians throughout their education. This article will explain some of the practice standards and how you can encourage your child to act as a mathematician!

Students are expected to:

"Make sense of problems and persevere in solving them."

There are many different ways to go about solving a problem. Students face challenging problems every day and they need the ability to persevere. This means that they can try many times to understand and solve a math problem. We want to hear students say, "I will work on problems and not give up!"

"Construct viable arguments and critique the reasoning of others."

Speaking and listening are important life skills. As mathematicians, students need to be able to justify their thinking. In addition to explaining what they did and why, they also need to listen to other students' strategies to decide if they make sense.

"Model with mathematics."

For some students, math can seem like a very abstract thing. It is important for students to see math as having meaning in the real world. Students need opportunities to build with objects, draw pictures, use number lines and write number sentences.

"Use appropriate tools strategically."

- All mathematicians use tools and part of being a mathematician is selecting the right tool for the job. This means that students decide which math tools (ruler, ten-frame, or calculator), pictures, drawings, and objects will best help them to solve a problem.
- Speaking and listening is a life skill and is the heart of what we are teaching students. On our district progress report we evaluate a student's ability to stick with challenging problems and justify their thinking. You can help your child by asking them: How did you get your answer? Why did you do that? How do you know you are right?



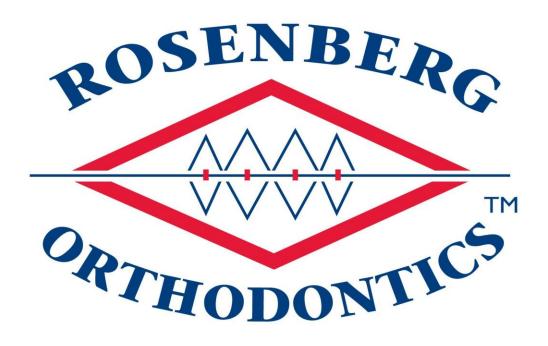
