### SBAC Testing Notice

#### Greetings Emerson Williams families!

The team at Emerson Williams has been working diligently to prepare all students for the roll out of the Smarter Balanced Assessment Consortium (SBAC), the new state standardized measure being utilized this spring across the district. Students will be taking the SBAC for reading, writing and mathematics (in grades 3-6) and will continue to also take the CMT Science Assessment in grade 5. There are many new pieces that are worthy of discussion, the focus of today's blog is to summarize changes with accommodations.

Perhaps one of the most important new pieces to note is that the SBAC includes guidelines for accommodations that are "Universally Embedded" and available to all students. Some examples of these include: taking breaks, extended time, use of a calculator when appropriate, use of scratch paper and spell check. In the past some of these accommodations have only been available to 504 and special education students under the old CMT assessment tool.

In addition to Universal Tools all students have access to "Designated Supports." These accommodations do require paperwork completion as they are determined on an individual basis. Some examples of Designated Supports include: color contrast, masking, and text-to-speech. It is important to note that these accommodations are available based on team discussion of student need and will be based on data that indicates that the student has already been using this accommodation and that it is in fact appropriate.

It may seem like a great idea to allow a student to use an accommodation that seems like it would be helpful, however if a student has never tried out this "tool" it could actually inhibit their success. I love to use the analogy that a figure skater never skates in new skates the day of competition: they skate in the skates they have been practicing in. Similarly, the team will recommend accommodations that students have already been using with success. Finally, students with 504 plans and those identified as special education students, may be eligible for "Documented Accommodations." These are also determined by the team, paperwork is necessary and the accommodations and recommendations will need to be documented in the student's Individualized Education Plan (IEP) or 504 Plan. Examples of Documented Accommodations include: closed captioning, Braille and American Sign Language. As with all other accommodations these will be recommended by the team if the team has data that provides evidence that this is an accommodation that the student has been using throughout the year and that it is appropriate. If you are the parent of a special education student, you will be receiving a phone call from your student's case manager in order to amend the current IEP to reflect the most recent recommendations. We know that this is all new and we are here to help as we all adjust to new language, terminology and procedures. Please do not hesitate to contact your school team if you have questions or concerns.

### **Health Tips**

•DEAR PARENTS AND STUDENTS,

#### •REMINDER FOR ALL SIX GRADE STUDENTS:

•You have recently received a reminder memo regarding your child's 11 year physical. If your child has had a physical in 2013, have the doctor fill out the blue health form for that visit. If not, make an appointment as soon as possible. I may be forced to withhold the transfer of progress reports and health records to Silas Deane Middle School if a physical is not received. All students must complete the necessary health assessment and required immunizations *PRIOR TO JUNE 1, 2014.* Any questions please don't hesitate to call me.

#### FIVE-TWO-ONE-ALMOST NONE

•5-2-1-Almost None is one way to promote a healthier lifestyle for children and their families. It is as simple as following these suggestions and tips for healthier eating and physical activity.

•5 FRUITS AND VEGETABLES - 5 stands for five or more servings of fruits and vegetables each day. Fruits and vegetables are packed with disease-fighting nutrients and give you energy, naturally.

•Serve at least one fruit or vegetable at every meal and snack.

•Dip veggies in low fat dressing. Tuck them in whole wheat pitas. Toss some on your pizza.

•Try and Try again. It may take several tests (10 or more) before they begin to enjoy.

•2 HOURS OF SCREEN TIME- 2 stands for no more than two hours per day in front of a screen (TV, video games and recreational computer time). A number of studies show a correlation between watching television and obesity.

•Be a role model - limit your screen time. Play or take a walk with your kids.

•Keep TV in a central location and out of your child's bedroom.

•Turn off the TV during dinner and talk about your day

•1 HOUR OF PHYSICAL ACTIVITY - 1 means at least one hour of physical activity per day. Physical activity, especially when it gets the heart pumping faster, is vital to maintaining a healthy weight and overall good health.

•Kids who are raised in active families tend to stay active as adults.

•Plan one physical activity for the family each weekend. Let each child take turns choosing the activity.

•Walking, bicycling, dancing and raking leaves can all get your heart pumping.

•10 minutes here, 10 minutes there and before you know it, you've been moving your body for an hour.

•ALMOST NONE refers to almost no sugary beverages - no more than two servings per week of soft drinks, sport drinks, and fruit drinks that are not 100% fruit juice. Over the last few decades, soda consumption has doubled for girls and tripled for boys.

•Choose water. Add a lemon or lime wedge or a splash of juice for flavor.

•Drink water, milk and juice yourself. Your children will learn by watching you.

•Avoid bringing sodas and sports drinks home. If it's there the kids will drink i




