

From the Principal's Desk

At the October 10, 2013 PTO Meeting, I shared some results data from the March 2013 CMT, and I also shared some basic information about the CMT vs. the SBAC (please see those notes below). The specific questions and concerns raised by parents in attendance were excellent ones, and are actually the very same questions that teachers and administrators across the district are grappling with presently. The intentions behind the SBAC testing are fabulous. We do need to amp up the rigor in both our instruction as well as our standardized assessments. We need to teach our students to be deeply analytic thinkers and problem solvers, not just rote memorizers with only basic skills. Mastery of basic skills is still very important, but more important are the ways in which students are then able to put those basic skills to use. The SBAC testing and the Common Core State Standards do provide guidance for teachers on how best to steer students in the right direction. Teachers are very supportive of the curricular changes brought about by the Common Core State Standards. They are appreciative of the way it has changed their teaching and the way it is already impacting student learning.

However, there are some very important questions about the actual SBAC testing that have yet to be answered. I enjoyed discussing these things with you during our PTO Meeting. One very obvious question pertains to the keyboarding skills of all our students, especially those in the younger grades. Since the SBAC testing will be entirely computer-based, will this test actually be measuring knowledge, skills, and applications, or will it more likely be a measure of the students' keyboarding skills? We have been told that SBAC results may not be released until the following fall (perhaps in September or October). How will this late release of test scores affect the way in which teachers use the data to inform their instruction right from the get-go? Administration of the SBAC will likely span over a three month window, in order to give all students time to cycle into the computer lab to take the test. How will the variation in test administration dates affect students' scores? Students will likely be able to take the test on a variety of different internet accessible devices (i.e., desktop computer, laptop, Ipad, Chromebook, etc.) How will the variations in the device used affect students' scores?

The SBAC test will likely be dynamic in nature; if students answer certain questions correctly, it will lead them to a bank of more rigorous questions. If they answer certain questions incorrectly, then the program will drop them down to an easier bank of questions. How will this all work, and how will the testing process be standardized for all students. We have just recently begun the switchover from the standard curriculum to the CCSS. Because of this, students who have not been immersed in the CCSS for their entire academic lives may be at a disadvantage to those students in future generations who will have been exposed to nothing other than CCSS. How will their lack of knowledge, skills, and years of CCSS practice affect their self-esteem and motivation to do well, if the test in front of them is too difficult?

All of these questions are excellent ones, and the answers are unclear and will need to be analyzed closely in the weeks, months, and years to come. As adults, we need to continue to have these excellent conversations with each other about standards and assessments. We also need to be unified and unwavering in our positive messaging to our students about both the curriculum as well as the assessments. Our children (my own as well!) are embarking on a new era of measuring student learning, and we need to psych them up for this. While not all students have masterful keyboarding skills, most students will still prefer to take the test on the computer instead of with paper and pencil. We need to get them psychologically pumped up for this. Teachers are preparing students to do well on the test. We need to remind students of how much awesome potential they have inside of them and remind them to always do their very best work on all assessments. We need to be their cheerleaders and their biggest supporters. I will continue to keep you all updated and posted regarding the Spring 2014 assessments, and I look forward to having these ongoing conversations with you.

CMT

- Connecticut Mastery Test
- Administered to all students in Grades 3 8.
- Reading, Writing, Math
- · Grades 5 and 8 take Science as well.
- Advanced 5
- Goal 4
- · Proficient 3
- Basic 2
- · Below Basic 1
- For purposes of both School and District Goals, we look at % of students who reach <u>Goal</u> <u>and Advanced</u>, vs. those students who are Below Goal in all areas.
- Most students take the test using <u>paper and pencil in a timed setting</u>.
- Some students (some Special Education students, some English Language Learners, some Section 504 students) take the test on the computer, in an untimed setting.
- There is availability of a modified (lower level) version of the CMT for some Special Education students. It is called <u>MAS (Modified Assessment System)</u>.
- One month window to administer all of the sub-tests (typically March 5 30).
- This school year (March 2014) is the very last year that the CMT will be administered in the state.

SBAC

- Smarter Balanced Assessment Consortium
- It has not yet been determined which assessment our students in Wethersfield will be taking this Spring.
- Possibility: Students may take the CMT as they always have in March, with some or all students taking Pilot Testing for the SBAC in the Spring as well.
- Or, students may possibly take just the SBAC Pilot testing. This is very likely.
- SBAC testing covers Reading, Writing, <u>Listening</u>, and Math.
- Because SBAC does not yet have a Science component, all 5th graders will continue to take the Grade 5 Science CMT each year until SBAC eventually develops a Science test.
- SBAC is entirely computer-based for all students.
- For the Pilot Testing last year, it was an untimed test for all students.
- There is no modified version of this test for Special Education students.
- This test measures the CCSS Curriculum, which is more rigorous, and involves more analysis and complex problem-solving on the part of the students.
- There may be a three-month window to administer all of the subtests.

Hello Parents!

October is National Bullying Awareness Month. This is a time to raise awareness about the seriousness of bullying and more importantly, what we can do to prevent it. Within our schools and within our communities there are misconceptions about what bullying is and questions about how bullying should be addressed. We are working hard at Emerson Williams to correct any misinformation about bullying, to proactively address issues of bullying and to teach our students what they can do to be a part of the solution. Mrs. Duffy and Mrs. DeBiase are both spending time in classrooms teaching students what bullying is and how to deal with it, as well as educating our students about the steps we are taking to prevent and address bullying in school. Teachers are reinforcing these messages with their students in countless ways throughout the school day. Teachers are always working to create a positive atmosphere in their classrooms and to promptly address any student conflicts. We are working together to teach our students the foundational skills of emotion management, conflict resolution, and empathy in order to create a more positive climate in our classrooms and give students the tools they need to prevent bullying. To have real success though, we must form a partnership with families to open lines of communication and spread these messages outside of the school as well. To that end, we would like to share some information on bullying. We hope you find this information helpful and that you can reinforce these messages with your children at home. Please contact Emily DeBiase, School Psychologist or Maureen Duffy, School Social Worker with any questions. Thank you!

What is Bullying?

Bullying can be verbal (to include online communication), non-verbal (social), or physical

It may include behaviors such as spreading rumors and gossiping, excluding others, name calling or put-downs, teasing, threatening or "blackmailing", obscene or offensive gestures, sending offensive/hurtful messages online, and physical actions such as destroying someone's property, blocking someone's path, pushing, shoving, bumping, etc.

Bullying is <u>REPEATED</u>

It is PURPOSEFUL

There is an <u>IMBALANCE</u> of <u>POWER</u> (the bully is either bigger, older, or perceived as having a higher social status than the victim)

Bullying VS Conflict: What's the difference?

Some of the same unkind behaviors (like name calling or even physical contact) may be present in instances of bullying and instances of conflict

The **difference** is that bullying is <u>repeated and involves an imbalance of power.</u>
Isolated instances of unkind behavior or "feuding" classmates are not considered bullying.

What can students and parents do?

Report it! Anyone who witnesses bullying can report it- parents, teachers, or students We also encourage students to be allies who look out for one another.

If an ally witnesses bullying he or she should get help from an adult right away.

In safe situations, allies can also stand up for the person being treated unkindly. They can help, offer a kind word, or even tell the student who is teasing to stop.

Is there anything we can do to prevent bullying from happening to begin with?

We can be role models for kindness and respectful interactions, even in times of conflict We can teach children emotion management skills so that they don't lash out when angry We can teach children conflict resolution skills so that if they are faced with a problem or challenge, they have the skills to handle it in a respectful and effective way We can educate our children about the seriousness of bullying and its consequences We can help children develop empathy, which is the ability to be aware of and care about the feelings of others

How is bullying addressed at school?

Once a report of bullying is made to a school staff member, the building administrator is informed and a bullying investigation begins

During the investigation, students are interviewed and once all of the information is gathered, a team of school staff members determine whether the situation meets criteria for bullying, or whether it represents conflict.

If the situation is deemed to be a conflict, students may be referred for mediation or another intervention plan may be established.

If the investigation confirms bullying, the incident is officially recorded as bullying in a log that is sent to the State of Connecticut. Parents are notified and school consequences and/or interventions are implemented.

Remember: Bullying is against the law! Schools must record instances of bullying, have a plan to address it, and must report instances of bullying to the State of Connecticut (including the names of students identified as "bullies").
